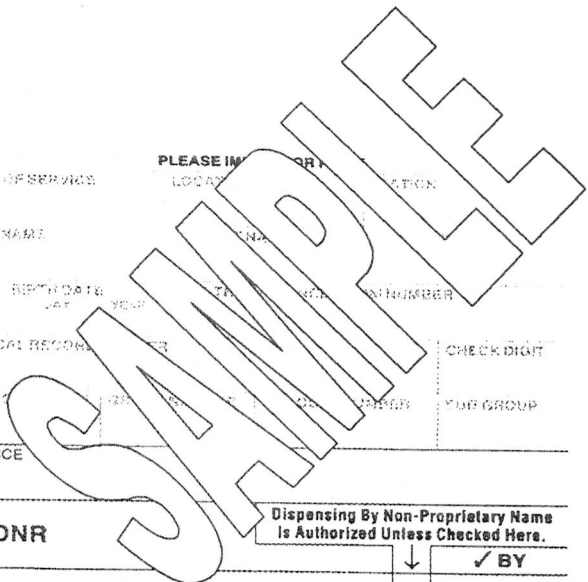

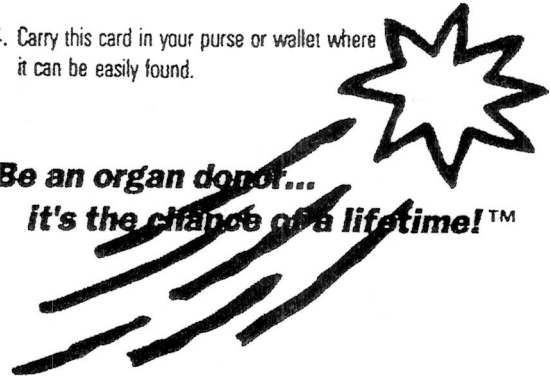

EXHIBIT H

Disclosures Regarding The Cremation Process

It is the policy of Neptune Society of Northern California to provide information concerning the cremation process so that our client families and friends are fully informed. The following disclosure statements contain a detailed description of each of the steps in the cremation process. These disclosures are provided in the interest of satisfying any questions and allaying any concerns you may have.

Following the disclosure statements, we have also included on this document an excerpt from the California Health and Safety Code which deals with the right to control disposition of the remains of a deceased person.

The cremation, processing and disposition of the decedent's remains will be performed in accordance with all governing laws and the following policies, procedures and requirements of Neptune Society of Northern California.

1. It is the policy of Neptune Society of Northern California that all human remains be wrapped in a muslin shroud and plastic liner. In isolated instances upon request, Neptune Society of Northern California will perform a cremation involving a casket or alternative cremation container, provided that such casket or alternative container: (1) be composed of materials suitable for cremation (Neptune Society of Northern California will not perform a cremation involving a metal casket); (2) be able to provide a complete covering for the human remains; (3) be resistant to leakage or spillage; (4) be sufficient for handling with ease; and (5) be able to provide protection for the health and safety of crematory personnel. Neptune Society of Northern California believes that wrapping the human remains in a muslin shroud and plastic liner, although not rigid, satisfies these requirements, so that the purchase of a casket or alternative container is not necessary to assure the dignity of the decedent and the health and safety of crematory personnel.
2. It is the policy of Neptune Society of Northern California to not disturb the dignity of the decedent by unwrapping the shroud. It is therefore the responsibility of the Authorizing Agent(s) to ensure that all personal property of value be removed from the decedent prior to wrapping in the shroud and prior to the removal of the remains from the place of death.
3. Cremation will only take place after all of the following conditions have been satisfied: (1) any scheduled ceremonies or viewing have been completed; (2) at least 72 hours have transpired since the time death occurred (Neptune Society of Northern California reserves the right to perform cremation thereafter according to its own schedule); (3) civil and medical authorities have properly executed and issued all required certificates and permits; and (4) all necessary authorizations have been obtained, and no objections have been raised.
4. Only deceased human bodies shall be placed in the cremation chamber. There shall be only one body cremated at one time in the cremation chamber.
5. Cremation is performed by placing human remains into a cremation chamber, where such remains are subjected to intense heat and flame. During the cremation process, it may be necessary to open the cremation chamber in order to reposition the remains to facilitate complete and thorough cremation. If repositioning is performed, it will not occur until at least forty five minutes into the cremation process. As a result of the cremation process, all combustible substances are consumed, except bone fragments and certain noncombustible material (such as dental metal, and other non-human material) which are not consumed at the operating temperatures of the crematory equipment.
6. Due to the nature of the cremation process, any personal possessions or valuable materials such as jewelry or dental metal that are left with the decedent and not removed prior to wrapping the human remains in a shroud and plastic liner may be destroyed, and if not destroyed, will be interred in Neptune Society of Northern California cemetery property in a manner which may make such possessions or materials subsequently unrecoverable.
7. Once the cremation is complete, the cremated remains are then swept or raked from the cremation chamber. Crematory personnel make reasonable and diligent efforts to remove all of the cremated remains from the cremation chamber, but it is impossible to remove all of them. In addition, while every reasonable effort is made to avoid commingling of remains, inadvertent and incidental commingling of cremated remains from the residue of previous cremations is unavoidable.
8. After the cremated remains are removed from the cremation chamber, all non-combustible materials (insofar as possible), such as bridgework, other dental metal, jewelry, body prostheses, etc., will be separated and removed from the cremated remains, and will be interred in Neptune Society of Northern California cemetery property in a manner which may make them subsequently unrecoverable.
9. When the cremated remains are removed from the cremation chamber, they often contain recognizable bone fragments. For this reason, all cremated remains will be mechanically processed (pulverized) so as to make them unrecognizable as bone fragments in accordance with the requirements of California law. This process may cause inadvertent or incidental commingling from the residue of previous cremations. These granulated particles will be virtually unrecognizable as human remains.

10. After the cremated remains have been processed, they will be placed in the designated urn or container. In the event that the urn or container is insufficient to accommodate all of the cremated remains, the excess will be placed in a separate receptacle which will be kept with the primary receptacle and handled according to the disposition instructions on the Authorization to Cremate and Final Disposition form.

California Health and Safety Code, Section 7100

"The right to control the disposition of the remains of a deceased person, unless other instructions have been given by the decedent, vests in, and the duty of interment and the liability for reasonable cost of interment* of such remains devolves upon the following in the order named.

- (a) The surviving spouse.
- (b) The surviving child or children of the decedent.
- (c) The surviving parent or parents of the decedent.
- (d) The person or persons respectively in the next degrees of kindred in the order named by the laws of California as entitled to succeed to the estate of the decedent.
- (e) The public administrator when the deceased has sufficient assets.

The liability for the reasonable cost of interment devolves jointly and severally upon all kin of the decedent in the same degree of kindred and upon the estate of the decedent; provided, that should a person accept the gift of an entire body under subdivision (a) of Section 7155.5, such person, subject to the terms of the gift, shall be liable for the reasonable cost of interment of the decedent.

A decedent, prior to his death, may direct the preparation for, type or place of interment of his remains, either by oral or written instructions, but a written contract for funeral services may only be modified in writing. The person or persons otherwise entitled to control the disposition of the remains under the provisions of this section shall faithfully carry out the directions of the decedent subject only to the provisions of this chapter with respect to the duties of the coroner.

If such instructions are contained in a will, they shall be immediately carried out, regardless of the validity of the will in other respects or of the fact that the will may not be offered for or admitted to probate until a later date.

This section shall be administered and construed to the end that such expressed instructions of any person shall be faithfully and promptly performed.

A funeral director or cemetery authority shall not be liable to any person or persons for carrying out such instructions of the decedent."

Note: Underlined emphasis added.

EXHIBIT H-2

The Cremation Process:

Step By Step

The information in this leaflet is intended to help you more fully understand what occurs in the cremation process. The steps are detailed and should be carefully considered.

Please note that this leaflet has been prepared on a general informational basis. Because of variations in state/provincial and local laws, there may be some difference in legal requirements.

■ Before Cremation Takes Place

- Any scheduled ceremonies, rites of passage or viewings have been completed.
- All authorization forms and permits must be completed and signed.
- The funeral director or cremation provider should be made aware if the decedent has a pacemaker, prosthesis or any other mechanical or radioactive devices or implants so that they may be removed, or if the decedent was treated with any radioactive medication. If such devices or implants are not removed, then the person(s) authorizing the cremation will be responsible for any damages caused to the crematory or crematory personnel by such devices or implants.
- All personal possessions or valuable materials, such as jewelry or dental gold, if so desired, should be removed by you or your designated agent prior to the time the decedent is transported to the crematory. Due to the nature of the cremation process, any materials not removed from the casket/container prior to cremation will be destroyed, or if not destroyed, will be disposed of by the crematory in a non-recoverable manner in accordance with applicable laws.
- Most crematories require the body be cremated in a combustible, leak-proof, rigid, covered container, if a casket is not being used.
- Non-combustible materials on caskets, such as decorative handles or rails, latches, etc., which could cause damage to the cremation equipment, may be removed prior to the cremation and disposed of by the crematory in a non-recoverable manner. Some states/provinces and some crematories do not allow metal caskets to be used in cremation. If a metal casket is used, the remnants of the metal casket shell, following the cremation, will be disposed of by the crematory in a non-recoverable manner.
- Depending on state/province and local laws, there may be a waiting period of up to 48 hours from the time of death before the human remains may be cremated.
- The crematory must be notified if anyone wishes to witness the casket/container being placed in the cremation chamber. Not all crematories offer this service. If witnessing is offered, the crematory may require a waiver or hold-harmless agreement to be signed to protect it from any liability.
- The crematory should be provided with an urn in which the cremated remains will be placed. If no urn is provided or the urn is not large enough to hold all the remains, the crematory will place the remains or any excess in a container made of plastic, light metal, cardboard, unfinished wood, or other suitable material to hold the remains until an urn is acquired or the cremated remains are scattered.

EXHIBIT H-2

The Cremation: Processing of the Remains

- - All cremations are performed individually. Exceptions can be made only in the case of close relatives, and then only with the prior written instructions of the authorizing agent(s) and only if state/provincial or local laws allow this.
 - The cremation process begins with the placement of the casket/container in the cremation chamber where it is subjected to intense heat and flame reaching temperatures between 1400 and 1800 degrees fahrenheit. All substances are consumed except bone fragments (calcium compounds) and any non-combustible materials, such as jewelry, dental gold, prosthesis, latches, hinges, etc., that were not removed prior to cremation as the temperature is not sufficient to consume them.
 - During the cremation process it may be necessary to open the cremation chamber and reposition the deceased in order to facilitate a complete and thorough cremation.
 - The time for cremation to be completed varies with the size and weight of each human remains, but usually takes between 1½ to 3 hours.
 - Following a cooling period, the cremated remains are then swept or raked from the cremation chamber. Every effort is made to remove all human remains. However, a small residue may remain in the cremation chamber, resulting in incidental commingling with other cremated remains.
 - After the cremated remains are removed from the cremation chamber, all non-combustible materials that have not been removed prior to cremation, will be separated and removed from the bone fragments by visible or magnetic selection and will be disposed of by the crematory in a non-recoverable manner.
 - Once the bone fragments have been separated from the other material, they may be further processed to reduce the size of the bone fragments to uniform particles.
 - Cremated remains, depending on the bone structure of the decedent, will weigh between 4 to 8 pounds, and are usually white in color, but can be other colors due to temperature variations and other factors.
 - The crematory will then place the cremated remains or any excess into the urn you have provided or a sturdy container as previously described.

After The Cremation Has Been Completed

- - The urn or the container containing the cremated remains will be returned to you or the individual, cemetery or funeral home you have designated on the cremation authorization form.
 - If you and/or other family members have not already decided on the final resting place for the cremated remains, you may wish to consult the professional who assisted you on the many options available. These options include...
 - Placement of the urn containing the cremated remains in an indoor or outdoor mausoleum or columbarium;
 - Interment of the urn containing the cremated remains in a family burial plot or in a special urn garden that many cemeteries provide for cremated remains;
 - Scattering of the remains in a cemetery garden especially created and dedicated for this purpose, or
 - Scattering the remains at sea or on land in accordance with state/provincial or local laws. (If scattering is done, you may wish to choose a site for a permanent memorial, such as placing the name of the deceased in a Book of Remembrance or on a plaque for a special location, or planting a tree in remembrance. Any of these will provide a place of pilgrimage for those who want to remember and celebrate the life of the loved one.)
 - The urn may, of course be taken to the home of a loved one, but plans should be made for an eventual permanent resting place.
